## **Talcott Greenhouse at Mount Holyoke College**

Last week I happened to be in South Hadley and decided to stop by the Talcott Greenhouse on the campus of Mount Holyoke College to see what they had in the way of orchids. I had not visited there in many years, well before I had developed an interest in orchids. The greenhouse is not as big as the ones at Smith College or UMass, but it is nicely laid out and maintained, and has an interesting variety of plants.

Walking straight in from the front door, the first greenhouse room is mostly filled with bromeliads and cycads with a few orchids mixed in. The next room features a pond in the center filled with aquatic plants. This is the main orchid room, with baskets of large specimen plants hanging over the pond. The benches



around the perimeter of the room are filled with orchids. Like many botanical gardens, Mount Holyoke is transitioning its collection away from hybrids to species. There were not a lot of plants in bloom when I was there, but the ones I saw were unusual species that were mainly

unfamiliar to me. The final room is a high-ceilinged conservatory filled with tall palm trees and banana trees, with ferns and begonias occupying the understory.

Heading back to the entrance, there are rooms to the left and right of the front door, filled with cool growing plants. The room to the left had several orchids, including cymbidiums that were sending up spikes.

The greenhouse at Mount Holyoke makes a pleasant stop, and could be part of a more extended visit to South Hadley. There are several specialty gardens surrounding the greenhouse, and an enormous European Beech tree near the library that is worth a look. Not far from the greenhouse there is a walking

trail around the upper pond. Mount Holyoke also has two museums- an art museum that is open most days (check website for hours), and Skinner Museum, which is described as a "cabinet of curiosities" and is open on Saturdays in the spring and fall. The town center has several restaurant options and the Odyssey Bookshop is always tempting.

From Route 116, go east on Park Street, the greenhouse is on the right at the corner of Lower Pond Road. Parking is readily available and free. There are several parking spots just across from the entrance to the greenhouse, or you can park in the lot behind the Village Commons across route 116.

We will have Spin the Wheel of Orchid Fortune for some prizes during the day.




