Spotlight on the Show Table:

Miltoniopsis Rouge 'Picardie' Grown by Nancy Braymiller

Many of us have been enticed by the stunning flowers of a Miltoniopsis and brought one home from a show or sale only to have it limp along for a few years and eventually take its leave. Miltoniopsis have a reputation as being difficult to grow, and many have lived up to their reputation. Which is why Nancy's plant Miltoniopsis Rouge 'Picardie' caught everyone's attention on the May show table. It had 5 spikes and numerous blooms giving it the appearance of a lush bouquet.

The genus Miltoniopsis occurs in the mountain cloud forests from Costa Rica to Peru. The three species (vexillaria, roezlii and phalaenopsis) that are used most in breeding are found only in Columbia. An interesting aspect of Miltoniopsis hybrids is that the large array of colors and patterns is the result of continued crossing and re-crossing of hybrids containing only these three species. Nancy's plant, Miltoniopsis Rouge, is 98% vexellaria and roezlii with 2% phalaenopsis. It's the influence of Miltoniopsis phalaenopsis that contributes the waterfall pattern that is so prized in Miltoniopsis.



Here's the story behind Nancy's Miltoniopsis, along with some tips for growing success:

"I bought the plant last Summer (2022) at the sale the AmOS had at Sugarloaf Gardens in Sunderland last June. Roger West was minding the sale table (the one with the orchids we bought from Kalapana Orchids) and he recommended that I buy this particular plant as it had three growths and a spike, so I did. It now has 5 spikes including those in bloom. Last year's bloom time was in the summer and this year it started to spike in early April.

I repotted it September 18, 2022 as it had finished blooming. It came in a 3-4" pot. I repotted it in small fir bark layered with sphagnum moss. I added a few small charcoal chunks and perlite. I used a 5" round transparent plastic pot that I added holes to. To make the holes, I used a soldering iron.

I grow the plant under high-intensity LED lights in my house in a room with a lot of light. When it is in bloom then it is on my kitchen windowsill facing North. I grow it in the temperature of mid-range 60 degrees at night and low

70s during the day.

What I feed it: I use the MSU formula fertilizer at the rate of one scoop per gallon, March through October and 1/2 scoop November through February. The only winter rest it gets is the 1/2 dose of MSU formula fertilizer. This is my feeding schedule:

- Week 1 1 scoop MSU fertilizer and 1 TBSP repotme's Quantum-Orchids probiotics
- Week 2-1 scoop MSU and 10 milliliters organic kelp liquid fertilizer
- Week 3 MSU and Quantum again, same amounts
- Week 4 flush only


